North Korea's 'socialist utopia' needs mass labor. A growing market economy threatens that

SEOUL (Reuters) - In January, thousands of North Korean students traveled to Mount Paektu, a sacred mountain where the ruling family claims its roots and where leader Kim Jong Un is building a massive economic hub at the alpine town of Samjiyon.

It is one of the largest construction initiatives Kim has launched, part of his campaign for a "self-reliant economy" even as he seeks to convince U.S. President Donald Trump to lift economic sanctions at their second summit later this month.

State media painted an inspiring picture of patriotic students braving harsh weather, eating frozen rice, and ignoring supervisors' worries about their health in order to work harder on the huge building site.

Kim has visited Samjiyon, near the Chinese border, at least five times for inspections over the past year.

He envisages a "socialist utopia" with new apartments, hotels, a ski resort and commercial, cultural and medical facilities by late 2020, barely four years after Kim ordered modernization of the "sacred land of the revolution".

North Korean defectors and human rights activists say such mass mobilizations amount to "slave labor" disguised as loyalty to Kim and the ruling Workers' Party. Young workers get no pay, poor food and are forced to work more than 12 hours a day for up to 10 years in return for better chances to enter a university or join the all powerful Workers' Party.

But as private markets boom and more people cherish financial stability above political standing, the regime has been struggling to recruit the young laborers in recent years, they say.

"Nobody would go there if not for a party membership or education, which helps you land a better job. But these days, you can make a lot more money from the markets," said Cho Chung-hui, a defector and former laborer.

"Loyalty is the bedrock of the brigades but what do you expect from people who know the taste of money?"

'BOILING BLOOD OF YOUTH'

Last year, after declaring his nuclear weapons program complete, Kim shifted his focus toward the economy, saying people's well-being was a top priority.

Samjiyon is at the center of his new economic initiative, touted as what would be a "model of modern mountainous city to be the envy of the world," alongside an ongoing project to create a tourist hotspot in the coastal city of Wonsan. here

Presidents Day protests decry Trump's emergency declaration

CHICAGO (Reuters) - Activists in Washington, Chicago and dozens of other U.S. cities protested on Monday's Presidents Day holiday against President Donald Trump's declaration of a national emergency to secure funding for a U.S.-Mexico border wall. Calling Trump's declaration an abuse of power and usurpation of Congress, organizers with the nonprofit advocacy group MoveOn.org and other participants said it was important to let the outrage over the move be heard.

"We disagree with the state of emergency declared by the president and stand with our immigrant colleagues and friends," said Darcy Regan, executive director of Indivisible Chicago, which co-hosted the protest there.

Trump invoked the emergency powers on Friday after Congress declined to fulfill his request for \$5.7 billion to help build the wall that was his signature 2016 campaign promise. His move aims to let him spend money appropriated by Congress for other

purposes.

The Republican president says a wall is needed to curb illegal immigrants and illicit drugs coming across the border. Democrats and opponents of the wall say it is unnecessary.

The protests in Chicago and Washington each drew a few hundred people on Monday afternoon.

Protesters gathered in Chicago's Federal Plaza carried signs that read "Dump Trump" and "Fake Emergency" and chanted "No wall, no fear, immigrants are welcome here."

Trump declares national emergency over border wall. Cheryl Krugel-Lee, a 32-year-old student, said she brought her 4-year-old daughter to the protest in freezing weather to set an example for her.

"This was a power grab by the Trump administration, and it's immoral and illegal," Krugel-Lee said. Organizers said 250 events were planned, including in New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Democrats have vowed to challenge the national emergency declaration as a violation of the U.S. Constitution. California state Attorney General Xavier Becerra said in television interviews that his state and others would sue the Trump administration on Monday.

Protesters to demand murder charge against cop involved in Pecan Park drug

A cadre of roughly two dozen activists gathered Monday outside Houston police headquarters demand murder charges against the narcotics agent accused of fabricating evidence used to justify a no-knock raid that left two civilians dead.

Carrying signs denouncing the police union president and demanding an end to "police brutality," protesters from People's New Black Panthers, Black Lives Matter Houston, the Socialist Alternative, and Indivisible Houston turned up at noon to voice their concerns.

"We have a dead couple here," said outspoken activist Shere Dore. "And that happened because one officer lied and I think citizens have a right to know. Are we truly protected with officers like this patrolling the streets?" From the outset, the Jan. 28 bust sparked controversy in the community after Rhogena Nicholas, her husband Dennis Tuttle and their dog were all killed in a shoot-out that failed to net the heroin stash police were looking for. Five officers were injured, including case agent Gerald Goines.

Initially Houston police Chief Art Acevedo lauded the veteran undercover officer, who was shot in the neck after bursting in the home at 7815 Harding. But on Friday, local media learned of a new search warrant seeking more information about officers' actions in the case, and Acevedo pulled together a hastily called press conference to announce that Goines would likely face criminal charges. HPD Chief Art Acevedo provides an update to investigation of an officer-involved shooting on Jan. 28 that ended with 2 people dead and five officers injured.

"We know that there's already a crime that's been committed," Acevedo said then. "It's a serious crime when we prepare a document to go into somebody's home, into the sanctity that is somebody's home."

According to the court filing that leaked out on Friday, an internal investigation found Goines allegedly lied about using a confidential informant to conduct an undercover buy at the Pecan Park home in the days before the deadly raid. When he initially filled out the affidavit used to justify the no-knock warrant, Goines wrote that he'd monitored the informant's heroin buy.

But after police raided the home - setting off a gun battle but only netting 18 grams of pot and 1.5 grams of cocaine - Goines was questioned about the informant he used. He gave two different names in two different interviews, but both ultimately denied taking part in the buy.

Investigators then got a full list of Goines' confidential informants, and they all denied making a buy at the Tuttle house or ever purchasing narcotics from Nicholas or Tuttle, according to the court filing.

Now, authorities are reviewing Goines' past cases, fielding calls for an outside investigation and determining what - if any - charges could be filed. An attorney for Goines did not respond to a request for comment.

In the days after the raid, Houston police union president Joe Gamaldi sparked controversy with comments in press conferences and on national TV, telling anti-police activists "we've got your number" and denouncing "dirtbags trying to take our lives when all we're trying to do is protect this community and our families."

Those comments served as one focus of Monday's protests, as some called - again - for Gamaldi's resignation.

"For someone with a badge to come out and say he's got activists numbers," said Yahcanon Ben Yah, national chairman of the Peoples' New Black Panther. "We would like to know whose numbers Joe Gamaldi has. Who is he tracking? How long has he been tracking them?"

Though small, the gathering drew protesters from police scandals of the

distant past.

"Enough is enough," said Richard Molina, nephew of Joe Campos Torres, a veteran killed by police officers in the 1970s in one of the most notorious police brutality cases in the department's history. "It's 2019. This kind of misinformation, lying to commit these kinds of actions...it shouldn't happen."

In this case, he said, the officer "is responsible" for the injured officers and slain couple.

"It's not a mistake," he added. "It was a deliberate lie and action. He needs to be held accountable."

Apple Is Targeting April To Launch Its New Video Service -- But Without Netflix And Probably Without HBO

OVERVIEW

Apple is targeting April to debut a new streaming product that will include original content free for Apple device owners and a platform to subscribe to other digital media services.

HBO hasn't signed on to the service yet but still may do so. But Netflix and Hulu aren't expected to be a part of the "Channels" service.

Apple is in the final stages of preparing its new streaming video service, which will feature free original content for device owners and a subscription platform for existing digital services. But don't expect Netflix to be a part of it, and HBO's participation is also in doubt, according to people familiar with the matter.

Apple is aiming to launch service in April or early May. It will allow customers to sign up for existing digital streaming products and watch them in the iOS TV application, similar to Amazon's Prime Video Channels. Apple wants to simplify mobile video viewing by housing content in one app instead of forcing users to launch separate apps for each service. Lions Gate's Starz; CBS, which owns Showtime; and Viacom are expected to offer subscription streaming services on the Apple platform, according to people familiar with the matter, who asked not to be named because the discussions are

private. HBO may join its premium network brethren but isn't as far along in discussions with Apple, one of the people said. Apple hasn't offered HBO the same terms that Amazon offered, said the person.

While the exact disagreement between Apple and HBO isn't known, media companies have been concerned about data sharing and revenue splits as Apple tries to aggregate existing services in new ways. For instance, The Wall Street Journal reported Tuesday that Apple is pushing to take nearly 50 percent of revenue

derived from a new subscription news service it's planning to launch later this year.

Apple is pushing for a 30 percent cut on every customer that subscribes to an over-the-top video service through its streaming service, three of the people said. Currently, Apple takes a 15 percent cut on revenue from customers that sign up to HBO Now, Netflix, and other streaming apps through the App Store, two people said.

Netflix and Hulu aren't part of Amazon Prime Video Channels and aren't expected to be a part of Apple's product either, according to people familiar with the matter.

Spokespeople at Apple, CBS, HBO, Hulu, Netflix, Starz and Viacom declined to comment.

Apple has jostled with traditional media companies for years over getting access to their content. CEO Tim Cook previewed Apple's new offering on the company's earnings conference call last month.

"We see huge changes in customer behavior taking place now and we think that it will accelerate as the year goes by with the breakdown of the cable bundle. I think that it'll likely take place at a much faster pace this year," Cook said. "We will participate in the original content world. We have signed a multi-year partnership with Oprah, but today I'm not really ready to extend that conversation be-

yond that point. We've hired some great people that we have a super amount of confidence in, and we'll have something to say more on that later."

Apple's deal with Oprah Winfrey and other big entertainment names like Reese Witherspoon and Steven Spielberg will give Apple device owners access to both film and TV content for no additional charge. Apple is planning to offer its original content free to device users, CNBC first reported in October. Apple planned to spend about \$1 billion on originals last year, the Wall Street Journal

reported. Apple has agreed to a number of movies and series already, including animated features, comedies, reality shows and dramas, most of which were compiled by Macworld here. (Courtesy cnbc.com)

Jury Says Monsanto's Roundup Causes Cancer, Awards One Victim \$289 Million

Overview

In a civil lawsuit against Monsanto, the maker of Roundup, there was enough evidence presented to convince the jury that Roundup does indeed cause cancer. The jury was so convinced, it ordered Monsanto to pay out \$289 million to one man. What's more, the jury found the company knew its product is

dangerous and has hidden the evidence.

A San Francisco jury has ordered Monsanto to pay \$289 million to Mr. Dwayne Johnson, a former pest control manager for an area school who developed incurable non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2014 after regularly using Monsanto's proprietary Roundup during his nearly four years on the job. The jury, which deliberated for three days, found Friday that the company had marketed its Roundup weedkiller products to the public despite being aware that the active ingredient, glyphosate, caused cancer.

Monsanto's actions showed a "deliberate effort to distort the truth," Brent Wisner, Johnson's lawyer, said in closing arguments Tuesday.

"The jury found Monsanto acted with malice and oppression because they knew what they were doing was wrong and doing it with reckless disregard for human life," said Robert F. Kennedy Jr., a member of Johnson's legal team. "This should send a strong message to the boardroom of Monsanto."

Johnson's case against Monsanto, the first of more than 4,000 similar cases in various state courts to go to trial, was expedited in accordance with California law when his doctors claimed in June court filings that the plaintiff might not live long enough to learn the verdict of the case.

CNN reports that this verdict could "set a massive precedent" for decisions on the remaining cases.

Monsanto continues to deny a link between its product and lymphoma and plans to appeal the decision, according to NBC.

Monsanto vice president Scott Partridge expressed the company's sympathy with regards

to Johnson and his family, but he expressed that the decision "does not change the fact that more than 800 scientific studies and reviews — and conclusions by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. National Institutes of Health and regulatory authorities around the world — support the fact that glyphosate does not cause cancer, and did not cause Mr. Johnson's cancer."

The World Health Organization found in 2015 that glyphosate was a "probable" human carcinogen, but other organizations, including the EPA, continue to deny the link, claiming insufficient evidence. (Courtesy <http://www.organi-CAuthority.com>)

Mark is a friend and wildlife biologist who has told me numerous times the herbicide Roundup is completely safe. Another friend, John, is a chemist who says Roundup is so safe he would almost swallow a spoonful of it. Of course, he has never done so. And now, we learn it's a good thing.

In a civil lawsuit against Monsanto, the maker of Roundup, there was enough evidence presented to convince the jury that Roundup does indeed cause cancer. The jury was so convinced, it ordered Monsanto to pay out \$289 million to one man. What's more, the jury found the company knew its product is dangerous and has hidden the evidence.

Once you read the details of the case, you'll agree with the jury — and you'll want to use something else to kill weeds in your yard. Fortunately, there's a natural way to do so that's much less expensive and easy to make at home....

This story is one we hear all too often — and never see any justice. Chemical manufacturing companies like Monsanto are eager to sell their products. To do so, they have to make them seem as safe as possible. So they come up with story lines like my chemist friend gave me.

I've heard several people say they would swallow a spoonful of Roundup. No one ever swallows the product, though. And yet, I keep hearing this same line of "proof" that it's safe. I've heard it so often, I have to wonder if it's a talking point started by Monsanto to alleviate fears of its product. It's an easy one to roll off your tongue — and no one would ever expect you to actually swallow it. But the point

is made.

Well, turns out, Roundup isn't so safe.



Dwayne Johnson's Sad Story

Dwayne Johnson has three children and is a 46-year-old former groundskeeper. He's a "former" groundskeeper because he's terminally ill with cancer.

In 2012, he took a position with the school district of Benicia, California, a suburb just north of San Francisco. The job required him to take care of the school grounds, which required him to spray Roundup to control weeds. There were many days where he had to spray the chemicals for several hours, giving him significant exposure.

During the trial, he argued that the exposure he had to the chemicals caused non-Hodgkin lymphoma (NHL), a blood cell cancer. On the stand, he detailed his pain and suffering, as skin lesions took over his body. "I've been going through a lot of pain," Johnson testified. "It really takes everything out of you ... I'm not getting any better."

After developing the cancer and seeing the connection, Johnson was horrified that Monsanto let him use the herbicide near schoolchildren. He said: "I never would've sprayed that product on school grounds or around people if I knew it would cause them harm."

Johnson likely has just months to live, and his medical bills are piling up. His wife is working two jobs, with many 14-hour days, in an attempt to pay for the medical bills. All to no avail.

The jury award of \$289 million is to cover past and future economic losses and punitive damages.

Johnson's attorney said, "We were finally able to show the jury the secret, internal Monsanto documents proving that Monsanto has known for decades that ... Roundup could cause cancer." These internal documents were internal emails from Monsanto executives that Johnson's attorney said "demonstrated how the corporation repeatedly ignored experts' warnings, sought favorable scientific analyses and helped to 'ghostwrite' research that encouraged continued usage."

Monsanto fought hard against the evidence presented in the trial. The company's lawyers maintained that Roundup is safe and not linked to cancer. They presented studies that countered the research and testimony submitted by Johnson's team. The herbicide is registered in 130 countries and approved for use on more than 100 crops. But here's where Monsanto ran into trouble.

In 2015, the World Health Organization's inter-

national agency for research on cancer (IARC) classified glyphosate as "probably carcinogenic to humans." This triggered a wave of legal and legislative challenges and opened the door for Johnson's lawsuit.

The company line, as detailed by Scott Partridge, the vice-president of Monsanto, has been to reject the verdict and push for an appeal. Partridge insisted the "verdict doesn't change the four-plus decades of safe use and science behind the product."



Partridge said the IARC verdict "has been demonstrated as having been corrupted." He asserts the organization does "no testing, they do no analysis, they have no laboratories, they simply render an opinion."

I'll be the first to admit the WHO isn't above reproach on much of anything. They're the pot calling the kettle black in this instance. But there's enough evidence outside of the IARC verdict to destroy Monsanto's lies. Much of this was presented at the trial.

Whatever you do, don't believe the hype that expensive chemicals that kill plants and animals are completely safe. They're effective at what they do because they're harmful products. It's common sense, but it's not commonly thought through.

If you think you have used a toxic herbicide such as ROUNDUP, you need to take steps to protect yourself. The best way to do that is to detoxify your body regularly. Many people go through a spring detoxification. This is a good idea. But to get these chemicals out of your body, you need daily protection from a detox product that can remove pesticides and herbicides from your blood and tissues.

Exercise and/or sitting in a sauna are also important, as sweating is a great way to release toxins from your body.

Eating organic fruits and vegetables is vital as well. Unless it says organic, you need to assume that it has Roundup on it and in it. Remember, many genetically modified products use Roundup as a part of its new gene structure.

Yes, there are natural products that will work, particularly as an herbicide. Vinegar is one. Combine one gallon of vinegar with two cups of salt and two tablespoons of dish soap (stir until the salt dissolves) and it will work even faster. The combination probably won't work as fast as Roundup — and may need more applications. But it also won't cause cancer. (Courtesy <https://www.nutrientinsider.com/>)

Exercise and/or sitting in a sauna are also important, as sweating is a great way to release toxins from your body.


