# Fifth device explodes in Texas; White House sees no link to terrorism

AUSTIN/SCHERTZ, Texas (Reuters) - A package bomb blew up at a FedEx distribution center near San Antonio on Tuesday, hastening investigators to seek the public's help in determining if there is any link to four homemade bombs that have rocked the state capital of Austin this month. Hundreds of federal investigators joined local authorities in probing the bombings, which the White House said do not appear to be linked to terrorism.

The latest blast knocked a female employee off her feet, police said. The package, filled with nails and metal shrapnel, exploded shortly after midnight local time at the FedEx Corp sorting facility in Schertz, Texas, about 65 miles south of Austin, the San Antonio Fire Department said on Twitter. Investigators were also examining a second suspicious package at the same facility, San Antonio Police Chief Bill McManus told reporters.

"There was one other package that we believe was also loaded with an explosive device that they are looking at right now," McManus told reporters in Schertz, about 20 miles northeast of San Antonio. In Sunset Valley, a town within Austin, police surrounded a FedEx store on suspicion it

was linked to the Schertz bombing. "The FBI is currently investigating a confirmed link between packages involved in the Austin bombing investigation and a mail delivery office in Sunset Valley. It appears that the source of the suspect packages was a private package delivery office in Sunset Valley," Sunset Valley police said in a statement.

Even with the apparent Austin link, it remained unknown whether the latest incident was the work of what Austin police said could be a serial bomber who is responsible for the four earlier devices that killed two people and injured four others.

The blast at the FedEx facility in Schertz was the fifth in the state in the last 18 days and the first involving a commercial parcel service.

"We are committed to bringing perpetrators of these heinous acts to justice. There is no apparent nexus to terrorism at this time," White House spokesman Sarah Sanders said in a Twitter post.

Investigators were trying to come up with a theory or intelligence regarding the motive for the bombings or identity of the bomber or bombers, a U.S. security official and a law enforcement official told Reuters.

The FBI was investigating the FedEx package explosion as if there were a connection to the Austin bombings, the law enforcement official said. Both sources declined to be identified.

Federal authorities at the scene offered few details, telling reporters their probe was in the early stages and that the building would be secured before investigators could gather evidence.

Authorities offered a \$115,000 reward to anyone providing information leading

the arrest or conviction of the culprit, and public urged the bomber to communicate with them to explain the motivation for the

### Maryland high school shooter dies after gunfight with officer: sheriff

GREAT MILLS, Md. (Reuters) - A 17-year-old student shot and critical- Maryland lockdown pulls Florida ly wounded two fellow students at a Maryland high school on Tuesday strong' morning before dying after exchanging gunfire with a campus security officer, the county sheriff said.

The shooting, which came amid a renewed national debate over gun violence following a school massacre in Florida last month, occurred just before 8 a.m. (1200 GMT) at Great Mills High School in St. Mary's County, county Sheriff Timothy Cameron said.

A 16-year-old girl and a 14-year-old boy were wounded and taken to hospitals. The girl was in intensive care with life-threatening critical injuries, the sheriff said, while the boy was in good condition.

The gunman was identified as Austin Wyatt Rollins, and Cameron said there was "an indication" of a prior relationship between him and the female student, though he said that

The latest in a long string of deadly shootings at U.S. schools and colleges took place a little more than a month after 17 students and educators were shot dead at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

That massacre sparked a new student movement against gun violence, including a national school walkout last week that Great Mills students participated in. It occurred just days before a planned Saturday march in Washington calling for new restrictions on guns.

Rollins pulled out a Glock semiautomatic handgun around 7:55 a.m. in a hallway and shot the students, the sheriff said.

The attack, which lasted less than a minute, ended after the school resource officer, Deputy 1st Class Sheriff Blaine Gaskill, ran inside the building and engaged with Rollins, with both firing a single round almost simultaneously.

The officer was not harmed, Cameron sheriff said. Rollins was confirmed deceased at 10:41 a.m. ET after being taken to a hospital. Parkland students and Great Mills students exchanged supportive messages on Twitter following Tuesday's shooting.

"We are here for you, students of Great Mills, together we can stop this from ever happening again," Emma Gonzalez, a senior at Stoneman Douglas High School who survived last month's rampage, wrote on Twitter.

Cameron said investigators would determine whether the shooter died of a wound from the school resource officer's gun or in some other way. An armed school resource officer had also been on the campus of Stoneman Douglas at the time of the

shooting there, and came under criticism for failing to stop the gunman, who was armed with an AR-15 assault-style rifle. The officer, who resigned, said he had not been sure where the gunfire

was coming from.

U.S. President Donald Trump and the National Rifle Association have proposed arming teachers to combat the threat of school shootings, while gun safety advocates have demanded a ban on semiautomatic rifles, among other laws.

The Maryland school is in Great



Mills, a community about 70 miles south of Washington.

## Gasoline prices jump in Houston ahead of

summer driving

After weeks of fluctuation, the cost of gasoline in Houston and across the country jumped as refiners begin blending pricier summer fuels.

The average cost of a gallon of regular unleaded in the Houston area increased 5.4 cents last week to \$2.31, while the national average rose 2.5 cents to \$2.54 a gallon, according to GasBuddy, which tracks fuel prices nationwide.

In Houston, gasoline costs nearly 24 cents more than it did at this time last year. Nationally, prices have increased by more than 25 cents during the same period.

Historically, fuel prices have ranged

widely at this time of year as refiners complete seasonal maintenance and switch to more expensive, lower-emissions fuel blends for the summer driving season. Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy, anticipates that gasoline this spring will cost 10 to 25 percent more than it did at this time last year, when oil prices were much lower.

"The national average now stands at its highest level in over a month and is likely to continue moving higher in the weeks ahead as demand continues to recover from the winter blues and the transition to summer gasoline kicks into high gear," he said.



## Oil rises to two-week high as OPEC cuts drain surplus

Oil climbed to a two-week high as output curbs by OPEC and its allies continued to deplete the remnants of a global supply surplus.

Futures in New York rose as much as 2 percent. OPEC and its partners, which are cutting output to ease the global glut, still expect markets to balance by about the third quarter, according to people familiar with the matter. Speculation is also growing that U.S. President Donald Trump may deploy sanctions against Iran and Venezuela that will curb oil output, according to PVM Oil Associates Ltd.

Oil has swung around this month after registering its worst February decline in half a decade. While the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries is showing confidence it will eradicate the global glut this

year, record U.S. production and rising American stockpiles have prompted speculation the cartel will have to extend its supply curbs into 2019 to reach the goal of reducing inventories to the five-year average.

"The oil market is in reasonably good health," said Ole Sloth Hansen, an analyst at Saxo Bank A/S in Copenhagen. "Oil is settling into a wide range between \$60 and \$70. Storm clouds could emerge if global demand growth begins to be called into question."

West Texas Intermediate for April delivery, which expires Tuesday, climbed as much as \$1.24 to \$63.30 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange, the highest intraday level since Feb. 28. The contract was at \$63.21 as of 9:30 a.m. local time, with total volumes traded in line with the 100-day average. The more-active May futures rose \$1.17 to

\$63.30.

Brent for May settlement gained \$1.27 to \$67.32 on the London-based ICE Futures Europe exchange, after slipping 0.2 percent on Monday. The global benchmark crude traded at a \$3.96 premium to WTI for the same month.



Women Know About The Increased Cancer Risk Of Oral Contraceptives. This New Study Shows That The Using Birth Control

Pills May Protect Against Certain Cancers For At Least 30 Years

### Birth Control Pills May Protect **Against Some Cancers For Decades**

After an analysis of more than 46,000 women, researchers from the University of Aberdeen in the United Kingdom found that women who had ever used oral contraceptive pills were at lower risk of colorectal, ovarian, and endometrial cancers, compared with women who had never used the pill.

Furthermore, the study found no link between the use of oral contraceptives during reproductive years and increased risk of new cancers in later life.

The study was led by Dr. Lisa Iversen, of the Institute of Applied Health Sciences at

Aberdeen, and the findings were recently published in the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), around 16 percent of women in the United States aged between 15 and 44 years are currently using oral contraceptive pills as a method of hirth control

The "combined pill" is the most common form of oral contraceptive used. This contains synthetic versions of the hormones estrogen and progesterone.

Since naturally occurring estrogen and

progesterone have been associated with cancer development, numerous studies have investigated whether oral contraceptives might play a role in cancer risk. Assessing the long-

term effects of oral contraceptives While some studies have uncovered a

link between oral contraceptive use and increased risk of breast cancer, others have associated the pill with a reduced risk of certain cancer types, including endometrial and colorectal cancers.

The aim of the new study was to assess the long-term cancer benefits or risks of oral contraceptive use.

To reach their findings, Dr. Iversen and colleagues analyzed the data of 46,022 women who were part of the U.K. Royal College of General Practitioners' Oral Contraception Study from 1968 to 1969. Participants were monitored for up to 44 years, and the researchers assessed the development of all cancer types during this



"Because the study has been going for such a long time we are able to look at the very long-term effects, if there are any, associated with the pill," notes Dr. Iversen. Findings are 'reassuring'

Compared with women who had never used oral contraceptive pills, those who had used the pills were found to be at lower risk of colorectal, endometrial, and ovarian cancers.


"So the protective benefits from using the pill during their reproductive years are lasting for at least 30 years after women have stopped using the pill," says Dr. Iversen.

The team did identify a greater risk of breast and cervical cancers with oral contraceptive use, but they found that this risk appeared to diminish within 5 years of ceasing use.

Additionally, the researchers found no evidence of increased risk of new cancer development in later life among women who had used oral contraceptives.

The team says that the findings should offer some peace of mind to women who use oral contraceptives.

"These results from the longest-running study in the world into oral contraceptive use are reassuring. Specifically, pill users don't have an overall increased risk of cancer over their lifetime and that the protective effects of some specific cancers last for at least 30 years." Scores of Americans are in an uproar since Food Safety News revealed the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will soon allow U.S. chickens to be sent to China for processing before being shipped back to the states for human consumption.

This arrangement is especially disturbing given China's subpar food safety record and the fact that there are no plans to station on-site USDA inspectors at Chinese plants.

Also, American consumers won't know which brands of chicken are processed in China because there's no requirement to label it as such.

It's Already Done With Your Seafood To ease concerns, lobbyists and chicken industry proponents argue no U.S. company will ever ship chicken to China for processing because it wouldn't work economically.



"Economically, it doesn't make much sense," said Tom Super, spokesman for the National Chicken Council, in a recent interview with the Houston Chronicle. "Think about it: A Chinese company would have to purchase frozen chicken in the U.S., pay to ship it 7,000 miles, unload it, transport it to a processing plant, unpack it, cut it up, process/cook it, freeze it, repack it, transport it back to a port, then ship it another 7,000 miles. I don't know how anyone could make a profit doing that." Yet, a similar process is already being used for U.S. seafood.

According to the Seattle Times, domestically caught Pacific salmon and Dungeness crab are being processed in China and shipped back to the U.S. because of significant cost savings.

"There are 36 pin bones in a salmon and the best way to remove them is by hand," said Charles Bundrant, founder of Trident, which ships about 30 million pounds of its 1.2 billion-pound annual harvest to China for processing. "Some-




